Exploratory Play
Allows your child to
explore, the world and
how things around
them function by using
their senses

Fantasy Play
Allows your child to
explore, their fantasy
world and experiment
with things that aren't
likely in real life

Imaginative Play Allows your child to play outside of the rules of the physical world Locomotor Play Allows your child to enjoy experimenting with the sensation of movement in play

Mastery Play
Allows your child to
show they can control
elements of their play
or the environment

Object Play
Allows your child to
develop their hand-eye
coordination and
manipulation skills

Recapitulative Play
Allows your child to
explore the past
through rhymes,
stories, rituals, history
and ancestry as well as
the themes of fire and
darkness

Role Play
Allows your child to
explore, different roles
and ways of being and
try them out in a safe
environment

Rough & Tumble Play Allows your child to develop their physical skills in a safe and friendly way Social Play
Allows your child to
develop their
understanding of social
rules and how they
work when playing
with others

Socio-Dramatic Play Allows your child to explore their social skills by acting out social roles Symbolic Play
Allows your child to
experiment with using
objects or symbols to
represent something
else within their play
